## Sunday Worship – Sound & Projection

This report is by way of a Tech Update, principally as it affects our Worship Services.

As you are aware, we are well equipped to amplify our regular services, including a Loop system for those with hearing aids (those with the latest technology do not require the loop).

We also endeavour to project the hymns and other details as required by the preacher, for example, where a congregational response is required, or specific images or videos. Where ever possible we use this to enhance the presentation of the service.

As a result of moving our services into the Hall during the winter of 22/23, we set out to replicate the sound and vision in the Hall as in the church. A loop was installed and we have been loaned speakers (ideally, speakers appropriate to the hall should be used, however, we have avoided the cost).

HDMI facilities have also been installed to enable the projection of videos.

Staffing - in recent years we have experienced a drop off of people who feel capable of continuing to help on the Rota. We have been blessed with the help of Emma and Ethan, however, there is the potential of losing them to University in the not too distant future. This is going to leave us very short of personnel, which could lead to some services NOT being projected. In other words, back to the Hymn books for everyone.

On these occasions we would still require sound. This is not over technical and easily picked up. **Would you please consider offering your services**, even if you just want to give it a go.

# Safeguarding

Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility. Church Volunteers who attend the Methodist Connexion Creating Safer Space Training are reminded that Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility and being aware of the types of abuse, recognising the abuse and knowing how to react to any potential safeguarding concern is covered in the training. In our world today sad statistics report that 1 in 3 women have experienced some form of domestic abuse and 1 in 4 men suffer physical violence in a relationship. According to the NSPCC sadly half a million children a year suffer abuse in the UK. Due to the Global pandemic and the cost of living crisis, domestic abuse cases are thought to have increased significantly. We are therefore very fortunate to have wonderful Church volunteers who give their time to be involved in training sessions which enable our Church to be a safe environment. Those who come through our doors including those who we do not yet know, can be confident they will be welcomed into a friendly non-threatening setting.

My role is to ensure all our Church Volunteers' DBS and training records are kept updated.

The Methodist Connexion Creating Safer Space Trainings are held in the Gloucestershire Methodist Circuit on a regular basis and should you be interested in attending a training, please let me know. Debbie

Anchors started back in September welcoming new and existing members back for a fun and action-packed programme. Our amazing Seniors continue to help on Monday nights, bringing lots of new games and ideas.

The Anchors have had fun doing lots of activities: they've learned about pandas, pretended to be pirates, played with parachutes, painted pancakes, and made poppies with their handprints. They took part in the Brigade-wide 140th anniversary challenge by making a collage of themselves, their toys and their cakes! We entered the collage into the national competition, and they all earned the exclusive 140 challenge badge. Along with the Juniors, we also buried a time capsule, to be opened in 10 years' time on the 150th anniversary, when our Anchors will have grown up to become Seniors.

At Christmas, they made Christmas cards, chocolate reindeer and learnt about the "Greatest Ever Christmas Gift". # **Open the Book**

Open the Book is a project which offers primary school children an introduction to the major stories of the Bible presented in school assemblies through the school year. It brings together a local school with a team of Christians from a local church. Each presentation takes a maximum of 10 minutes and the story scripts, originally from the Lion Storyteller Bible, have all been written by Bob Hartman.

Open the Book fulfils OFSTED inspection requirements for Collective Worship and has been successfully used in a multi-faith context. Children are invited to say Amen at the end of each week's short prayer if they want to make it their prayer. What a privilege! Hucclecote Methodist Church takes Open the Book into Coopers Edge school (as part of an ecumenical team) on a monthly basis and an all-Methodist team goes into Dinglewell Infant School most weeks. Whenever we ask the children for volunteers to join the "actors" the response is a sea of hands. We are very grateful to those who have made costumes and props over the years. The costumes are stored in team members' spare rooms but it can be more challenging to remember where we put some of the props!

Both teams are looking for more adult volunteers. The Dinglewell team has been struggling recently due to illness and would particularly welcome new members - even on a part-time basis (i.e. not every week). # Welcome Café and Warm Space

It has been another successful year for our Welcome Café.

We continue to tweak the running and fine tuning at regular steering group meetings, addressing issues or concerns that arise. Our inspection last year rated us with the ultimate grade 5 for hygiene and running procedures.

The Café is still run on a donation only basis, asking for a contribution only when cash is available and affordable for our customers.

Monday evenings, although slow in uptake initially, have grown with a regular customer base from parents of Brigades children and of course we have a regular family that have travelled with us from the very beginning. The twins are now 2 years old. We all miss Di Rotherham who was a staunch and regular volunteer working alongside Sally. Lynne and Sue D have kindly filled the huge gap that Di leaves.

Now, on Wednesday and Thursday mornings, regular groups meet at the same time on our premises, taking advantage of the chance for a hot drink and a piece of cake. There is a definite buzz on our premises during these occasions and our volunteers are kept very busy.

We continue to open on the 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Saturdays of the month and our volunteers get a break as we remain closed on bank holidays. We have discussed, occasionally, extending our opening times. But feel that this would be too much for our limited group of servers. We would welcome more volunteers, should you feel able to help with this valuable work.

Our servings of cake and biscuits are supplied by generous home bakers and occasionally from other pre-prepared sources. We facilitate our cake storage by using the freezer, with the aim of never being short of an offering.

A huge debt of thanks goes to our volunteer servers and bakers who give generously of their time, energy and expertise. An afternoon celebration of 'Thanks' was held in February when laughter could be heard, and great fun was had.

Together, with a few grants and our donations, we have been able to upgrade the Welcome kitchenette and replace the flooring and tables. Our next aim is to replace the heavy red chairs with something more practical and easier to move. We continue to give regular grants to HMC towards heating and premises costs.

Thanks go to Nick Butler who has registered our Café as, "A Place of Welcome," an Anglican initiative and open to all denominations, and we can be seen on that and our own website as such.

Please pray with us for the continued work of the Café and for our lovely team of volunteers. This project has, in large part, contributed to HMC's awakening, post pandemic. Sue

# **MWiB (Methodist Women in Britain)**

for women, for justice, for Christ

This has been a year of change and reorganisation. The MWiB executive now has two co-chairs, one for the North and another for the South. The original Methodist Districts are now organised into larger areas, co-ordinated by ambassadors. HMC is in the Bristol and South Wales Area.

In February, finding that over three bi-annual meetings, our area ambassador was holding three identical meetings across the District, Circuit and Locally, it was decided to hold one meeting where all interested parties came together in one place, namely Hucclecote. It was good to get so many from across the Bristol District, all in one place at the same time, connecting across the larger area. Many would have met each other previously, pre pandemic, at the annual residential conference at Ammerdown. These times of fellowship and renewal haven't been enjoyed since the pandemic.

Locally and across the District we finished our two-year fundraising drive for Marie Curie last August. In total we raised £1700.

This year and for one year only (now back to our pre pandemic timeline) we concentrate on raising funds to support Médecins Sans Frontières (Doctors without Borders). It is hoped that we will be able to listen to a speaker from MSF later in the year at Ladies Friendship Group.

The Easter Offering Service is written by members of MWiB every year and locally our circuit churches raise the best effort. Last year we contributed to over £7500 to the Methodist World Mission Fund.

The Service this year is based on the theme, "Let Justice Roll," and will tell of positive ways that individuals have addressed issues of justice. Ours, at HMC, including the dedication, will be held at Hucclecote on Sunday 28<sup>th</sup> April.

As an ambassador I will be traveling across the Area to inform and educate various church groups on the work, both at home and

abroad, of MWiB. If you would like to learn more, join me, and come along to one of our gatherings.

#### **The Welcome Garden**

The Welcome Garden volunteers meet on Wednesday mornings throughout the year from 10am until 12. We are a group of people who enjoy chatting at the same time as growing vegetables and fruit. Anyone is welcome to come along and, if you cannot help us physically, then please come and sit on a bench and share your growing tips. We always spend (lots of) time in the Welcome Café!

Last year the produce from the garden was used at our own Friday Lunch Club and at the St Oswald's Food Hub in Coney Hill, we ate some ourselves and we gave some to people in the Welcome Café. We grew potatoes, onions, runner beans, kale, Swiss chard, peas, squashes, beetroot, tomatoes, sprouts and rhubarb. We have also planted thornless blackberry, raspberries, gooseberries and apples.

We aim to grow produce as sustainably as we can and without chemicals so we don't use slug pellets or weedkiller. We have experimented with a "no dig" bed which has produced good results. We make our own compost and leaf mould, turning natural materials (grass and leaves) that would otherwise be wasted, from the church grounds, into soil improvers. Thanks to Gus at Barnwood Builders a local scaffolding firm has recently donated some used boards for edging our vegetable beds.

We want to encourage children to get involved in growing food so we work with Jellytotz and the Boys' Brigade and Girls' Association, helping them to plant and enjoy sunflowers and crops.

One of our aims this spring is to level out the paved area at the back of the BB garage so that we can turn it into a safe working area for sowing and potting etc. The slabs have been moved and we are looking for a contractor with a small digger to prepare the base. In November 2022 we were grateful for a grant of  $\pounds$ 1000 from the Leonard Laity Stoate Memorial Trust to help with these costs.

Using our field to grow food, trees and pollinator friendly flowers has arisen out of our concern about the decrease in biodiversity in the UK and wanting to do something as a church to help in the battle to tackle climate change. It also helps towards the Eco Church award. You may already have seen a small area of grass at the front of the Welcome being developed into a pollinator-friendly flowerbed, thanks to seeds and plants donated by church members.

# **Property Report**

Another challenging year. It takes a lot of time and effort as well as money to keep our premises in the state to which you are all accustomed to. To achieve this the Property & Finance committee meet as a subcommittee of the Church Council on a bye monthly basis. New members are always welcome to join from the Church Council.

Over the last twelve months several maintenance tasks have been identified and completed e.g. But by no means a full list:

**Build Back Better Grant (BBB):** Following the successful application and allocation of the grant of **£11,115** from the Council BBB scheme, the committee has spent the monies as follows:

- Replaced Welcome and Kitchenett flooring
- Purchase 40 blue plastic chairs for the Hall
- Enhanced preparation and serving facilities in the Kitchenett
- Improved Wi-Fi resilience throughout our buildings
- Launched a new Church Website

Hall: Panelling around Hall lower wall and new stage doors

*Roof Repairs:* Repairs to Choir Vestry and Organ loft roofs. Ongoing monitoring.

*Graveyard:* Essential maintenance was carried out to repair the corner of the graveyard wall.

*New chairs:* 20 new chairs purchased for our younger folk situated in the Fellowship Room.

*Heating:* Ongoing discussions being held around changing the Church heating and improving the Welcome heating.


*Finances:* Further to the separate Treasurers report, allowing for the efforts of the various fund-raising activities the Church's balances bucked the trend of decline in the last financial year by finishing up on the previous year. However, the P&F have already overspent on this year's budget for maintenance, so we hope no unplanned expenditure appears.


# **Finance Report**

We have had a rather different financial experience this year. We have received the remaining money from Enovert to fund work on the roofs, and money from the council's Build Back Better initiative. This is shown on the chart of income sources, below, a total of £101,235.



"Donations" is mainly gifts from individual groups in the church. We are grateful for this, particularly the amounts given from the café. And, as ever, we appreciate receipts from the fundraising events.

We now come to how that income was spent. The "Projects" covered various grant-funded work. The total spend was £95,877.



It might appear that we had a large surplus, but most of it is grant money still to be spent. We did, however, achieve a surplus (income over expenditure) of £777 once unspent grant money was taken into account. That the accounts were in surplus is due to the generosity and hard work of so many of us, for which we grateful thanks. The figures in this report are a summary – ask if you want any information or amplification.

We were able to make the following donations, from our communion collections, special appeals and a tithe of our fundraising:-

A total of £3272.15. This, of course, doesn't include the fundraising for various causes that church groups make that doesn't come onto the church books. It is good to see how we respond to a world of need. For the current year, we seem likely to keep income and expenditure roughly equal.

If you are fortunate enough to be a taxpayer and haven't made a gift aid declaration, perhaps this is a good time to do it.

But if we are to do what we all really want to be doing, bringing God to Hucclecote, it would be great to be able to concentrate on that, rather than worrying about the bills!

Finally, we should recognise all the work done by Andrew Jackson and Ron Keasley for all they do to help me with the Church finances.
